2019 Highlights of the Chapter for the two-year term by the Regent

It's the Annual Meeting and the end of another administration serving the Commonwealth Chapter of the National Society Daughters of the American Revolution. Where do we begin to count all that has been accomplished in the past 2 years? All that has been learned? All that we have nurtured? All of the friendships that have formed? And how do we count the ways that we have been blessed? Quite honestly, I think we should simply appreciate today.

I don't have an annual Regent's Report of accomplishments. When I thought of all that we enjoyed, created, and lived... together as a chapter, it seemed that the accomplishments were because the members of this chapter experienced these two years together. We created new events, supported veterans and our military, and placed wreaths on graves. The chapter now supports the local Goochland Historical Society Library, has a Sunshine Jar, and plays Mini Golf just for fun! We enjoy honoring students for their patriotism and good deeds, and support community programs.

The members enjoyed the beautiful sounds of harps, listened to noteworthy speakers and talented authors, and laughed at the likes of Patrick Henry.

When asked to share the accomplishments of the chapter of this past year in 200 words or less for the State Conference, it was hard to do! This is what I shared...

Commonwealth is today's DAR, 366 strong! Members are engaged, informed, and continue to open new doors! Members participated in 20+ commemorative events, such as DAR Historic Marker Dedication at French's Tavern, Joint Resolution #423 personally delivered by House Speaker Kirk Cox, recognizing the 100th Anniversary of the American's Creed, and a DAR Flag Certificate presented in front of 3,000 patriots, to owners of the Tallest Flag Pole in the state! Members distributed 2,000 American flags, one by one, at events, such as historic St. John's Church naturalization, Dogwood Dell Amphitheatre on Veterans Day, and Naval Sea Cadet Awards Ceremony at Fort Lee. Blue Star Families of Richmond founder was awarded Women in American History, archived on DAR.org. New public and private websites at www.CommonwealthDAR.org attracted prospective members, and provided chapter information conveniently. Members selected to receive their yearbook in print or PDF. There was a collaborative effort of committee contributions to the newsletter, which was emailed by MailChimp. Over 60 percent on average opened it! Marketing with other organizations increased logo exposure and DAR recognition. Fresh ideas presented with enthusiasm helped to increase overall participation, especially for State Conference and Continental Congress. Hundreds of fun photos were shared!

So... what is it that we accomplished in 2 years??? More than can be reported here.

Before several items are taken to the storage facility, they were put on display on the back table. They are the reports of the Committees in the Historian's notebook, a scrapbook, and chapter awards.

I have had the pleasure of serving alongside and amazing team of women on the Executive Board, and I learned more from them than they realize. The membership is supportive and kind in so many ways. PATRIOTS RECORDS PROJECT

I want to make you aware of The Patriot Records Project Committee. Members can volunteer and work from home helping NSDAR index Revolutionary War Patriots from old documents. The index will be available as part of the DAR Genealogy Research System.

I started volunteering in 2017 and have indexed over 1400 names. You simply sign in to the project and are given a copy of a digitized image, which contains names of patriots. It could be a master roll that records those serving in a particular regiment, it could be the payroll that records the pay these patriots received, and many more service documents. You will then record that name in an index. Detailed instructions are provided and once you get going, the going is easy. The index is made possible by DAR member volunteers and is a great tool to assist the finding of an elusive ancestor. Volunteers, nationwide, indexed over 192,000 names in April alone.

The 12 middle schools of Henrico Co. were contacted and requested to read the Preamble of the Constitution during morning announcements during Constitution Week.

A display of posters, flags, and Constitution facts was arranged in display cases at The Tuckahoe Library.

An information table was set up at our September Tea, which coincided with the start of Constitution Week. A brief history of CW was read and the CAR joined us in reading The Preamble.

A Commonwealth Chapter bookmark with the Preamble written on one side and recording the date of CW on the other, was designed, printed and donated for distribution. Over 250 were distributed at the Naturalization Ceremony at St. John's. Many are earmarked for distribution this summer to Crossnore School, Kate Duncan Smith Smith and Tamassee Schools.

I am excited for the further educational outreaches this committee has for the coming year. If you have an interest in joining me, please be in touch.

For 2018-2019 reporting, three elementary schools, selected based upon 100% lunch participation, were provided a Constitution Week poster for their library during Constitution Week. The book, <u>A More Perfect Union</u>, was donated to each school library. These schools were given a total of 1700 Commonwealth Chapter bookmarks for distribution to students.

This committee mounted a Constitution display at Tuckahoe Library for the entire month of September. 1000 Commonwealth Chapter bookmarks were available for library patrons to take home.

May 2019 Annual Report

On November 8, 2018 the Commonwealth Chapter dedicated French's Tavern at 1600 Old Buckingham road in Powhatan, VA. with a bronze NSDAR Historic Marker. The plaque reads:

"Historic French's Tavern Built in the 1700's Commonwealth Chapter National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Dedicated November 2018"

Frances Eppes IV originally owned the property known as Swan's Creek Plantation. His granddaughter, Martha Wayles Skelton, married Thomas Jefferson and he acquired the property. The plantation home was operated by Hugh French and called French's Tavern. Carolyn and Fred Neurhor purchased the property in 1993.

Carolyn Neurohr is a Commonwealth Chapter member and gave those attending a tour of the Tavern and property at the time of the dedication. Members of the Powhatan Historical Society and the Goochland Historical Society were in attendance along with Past Historian General and Honorary Virginia State Regent Bana Caskey, Regent Lisa Doan, Historic Preservation Chairman Marcy Thomas and Commonwealth Chapter members.

CHAPTER MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE 2018-2019

Several chapter members and prospective members attended each and were invited to sit together with other VADAR District II members. The presiding judge recognized members of DAR in attendance. In each ceremony, our chapter assisted with the welcoming of 60 newly naturalized citizens from many different countries, shaking hands and distributing USA Flags and Flag Codes.

On February 21, 2018, as Chairman, I participated in two Naturalization Ceremonies held at the Federal Courthouse in Richmond. I represented Commonwealth Chapter and greeted a total of 143 newly naturalized citizens, who I welcomed with a handshake and presented with USA Flags and Flag Codes.

On Thursday, April 19th, our chapter co-sponsored a Naturalization Ceremony at St. John's Church. We were involved in the planning and program. Bana Weems Caskey, Honorary State Regent and Past Historian General, gave welcoming remarks. Huguenot High School JROTC Color Guard presented The Colors and their soloist sang The National Anthem. We presented USA Flags, Flag Codes, and Saluting the Flag cards to the newly naturalized citizens. Our own "authentically costumed" chapter members distributed additional USA Flags to children in attendance. Following the ceremony, our chapter hosted a reception in the Parish Hall. Forty reserved seats were made available to chapter members.

6 Commonwealth Chapter members participated in two Naturalization Ceremonies, supported by District 2 of the VADAR.

The Scotchtown Plantation Naturalization Ceremony on September 18th and the Naturalization Ceremony at the historic Henricus State Park on September 26th.

February 2019

Sarah McCurry and I attended two Naturalization Ceremonies on Wednesday, February 20th in the Richmond Federal Court House. These ceremonies take place the third Wednesday of every month and an Americanism Committee Representative from each VADAR chapter is present as well as one for District 2.

Sarah and I handed out American flags to all the children before each court session. There were 67 people in the 11 AM session from 38 countries and 73 at the 1PM session from 38 countries who became new American citizens. The session started with each candidate being introduced, then standing, and being acknowledge by the court; Linda Carter with the U.S. Citizenship and Immigrations Services then led the candidates with the Oath of Citizenship.

The Honorable David J. Novak gave a 15-minute speech highlighting the history of being a naturalized US citizen, naming several famous naturalized citizens. Everyone stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance then Judge Novak gave a few closing remarks, he then shook each person's hand, Linda Carter handed them their certificate of citizenship, and Sarah and I gave them a small American Flag with "The Flag Code" pamphlet which the DAR distributes to all new American citizens.

April 2019

Commonwealth Chapter, NSDAR co-sponsored their third Naturalization Ceremony with St. John's Church Foundation, inside the historic church in Richmond on April 30th at 11am.

73 people from 33 countries became US citizens; Cynthia Burgess CC NSDAR Chorister sang the Star-Spangled and Bana Caskey, the Honorary State Regent and Past Historian General gave welcoming remarks to prospective citizens and their families on behalf of our chapter.

The new District 2 Director, Nancy Ridgway, and her husband, attended the ceremony as well as Monique & Richard Smith with US Iron & Metal (they hosted the Flag Raising Ceremony at their company site in Nov.).

ASSISTANT TREASURER'S REPORT Paige Barholomew 2017-2019

Every month I sent out reminder notices thru e mail about the upcoming luncheons/meetings & collect the fees. I send a 'preview' to the Regent, Vice-Regent & Treasurer in case they need to add additional information about the Speakers, etc. I get the dates & Speaker info from the Chapter Yearbook. The Notices are mailed on the first of the month. Checks or Payments are due the week before the meeting so that we can call in a 'count' for the lunches. The Regent sends me the e mail list of members as close to the first of the month as possible. The Roster changes every time with new members being added, transfers & deaths. The notices are all 'Blind copied'. I have AOL, so I had to send the notices in 4 different batches because the recipient file was too large. I keep an excel spreadsheet with each members' name on it. As checks come in, I note this on my spreadsheet. Checks are mailed to my home, but sometimes, I would get them delivered or handed to me at other events. I check Pay Pal (another way to pay for lunches) & note those payments on my spreadsheet. The Treasurer has the log in & password which she will give to the Assistant Treasurer. I only check Pay Pal for payments to our account. I do nothing else with it. I used codes (PP, Pre, C, \$19) as a way for me to tell how the payments were made- Prepaid, PayPal, Checks, Comp lunches, etc.) Speakers were given free lunches & I was told who was to receive the Comp'd lunches by the Vice-Regent.

The Monday before the Friday lunch, I would notify the Vice-Regent of the lunch count based on my spreadsheet totals. She would then notify Westwood so they would know how much food to prepare. Wednesday before the Friday lunch, I would send my list of attendees to the Regent & Vice-Regent. I would modify the excel spreadsheet, so it only showed the names of those attending & it was all on 1 page with grid lines. This helped the ladies check off names when they came thru the lunch line. The Treasurer would then pay Westwood based on how many lunches were ordered & if any paid that day, an extra \$5 was charged (I never had to charge extra because I usually knew who was going to be a 'No show'). Ladies were very good about notifying me if they couldn't attend.

After the lunches, I would scan the checks & make a Bank deposit. I would send the scanned copies to the Treasurer with the Deposit Total. I found it better to wait until after the lunch to make the deposit. Several times, ladies would call & say they were now unable to attend & for me to tear up their checks. Also, more checks would come in on Friday, the day of the lunch from the last-minute attendees.

This was a fun job & a great way to get to know the DAR members.

Donut Dollies - National Defense Report at the May Annual Meeting by Janet Varvel

On June 14th members of Commonwealth chapter will gather at the Veterans Hospital in honor of Flag Day. It has been suggested that you come in costume, dressed as a donut Dolly. Well, what is a Donut Dolly?

In WWII the American Red Cross was asked by the US Armed Forces to provide recreational services to the servicemen in various theaters of operation. In the beginning remodeled London buses or "Clubmobiles" were

operated by three American women. Each Clubmobile contained a kitchen with a donut machine and 50 cup coffee urns. One woman drove the truck and the other two were the cooks. They also sold gum, cigarettes, books and played music for the back of the bus lounges and bunks. In 1944, two and a half ton trucks were converted and used. The women who staffed these vehicles were no military, and had to be highly qualified, eventually even with college degrees. The number of volunteers grew to 255, and they drove these service mobiles in England, France, Germany, Belgium and Luxembourg.

A similar program was introduced by the Red Crosst in 1950 to service the Korean war. By the time the program ended in 1973 almost 900 women had served in Korea alone. It may have been during the Korean war that the name "donut Lassie" was dropped and "donut dolly" was introduced. The name may have been new, but their work was not.

As early as WWI, women of the Salvation Army volunteered to join the front lines to support the American forces. They were supplied with gas masks, helmets, and 45 revolvers. In September, 1917 (just 100 years ago), four women traveled to the eastern trenches of France. They played the Victrola and served hot cocoa. Then one of them decided the men would feel more at home if they served them donuts. So, they collected excess rations for the dough and shell casings and wine bottles for rolling pins. They filled a helmet with lard. Later condensed mild cans were used to make the round shape. The donuts were then dusted with powdered sugar. They were immediately a hit, eventually cooking 2,500 donuts a day, 8 dox cupcakes, fifty pies, 800 pancakes, and 255 gallons of cocoa. Their numbers grew, and they were even honored by President Roosevelt. Eventually other groups joined the volunteers, like the YMCA, the Knights of Columbus and the Quakers.

Report for Term of Office 2017-2019

2017 Annual Dues and Yearbook Mailing - The Chapter yearbooks and dues notices were sent via first class mail in two batches on August 31 and September 1, 2017. The envelopes included a return label with the DAR logo and were stamped "Time Sensitive Dues and Yearbook" to ensure that members took notice of the package when it arrived in the mail.

- Cover letter from the chapter regent (Three separate versions for each class of membership: LIFE, associate, and regular. Special note written by the regent was added to letters sent to new regular members who had already paid their dues.)
- Dues invoice with multiple pages, stapled
- Yearbook (printed by Minuteman Press)

Total number prepared for mailing: 338

Hours required for preparation of mailing: 14

Cost for postage: \$1.82 each for a total of \$615.16

Additional costs: Envelopes (\$65.36), Yearbooks (\$691), Return address labels (in-kind donation), Self-inking stamps (in-kind donation), Labels (in-kind donation), printing of cover letters (in-kind donation), printing of dues invoices (in-kind donation). Total additional costs of \$756.36. Total cost for mailing: \$1,371.52

2017-2018 Mailings to members without access to E-mail - Key chapter announcements were mailed to 34 members without E-mail addresses. These mailings included notices of proposed by-law changes.

2017-2018 Additional Duties

- A standard chapter letterhead was created to be used for all official chapter correspondence.
- Chapter notecards were designed to be used for board correspondence.
- Yearbooks and by-laws were mailed to 22 new members who joined throughout the year.
- Thank You letters were sent throughout the year at the request of the regent and other board members.
- Notices were mailed in February to members who had not paid dues.
- Anniversary announcements were mailed in April to 23 members.

2018 Annual Dues and Yearbook Mailing - In an effort to save money on the annual yearbook and dues mailing and respond to member requests for an electronic version of the yearbook, members were surveyed on their willingness to forgo the printed yearbook in favor of an electronic version which would be emailed. A survey was conducted in August through Survey Monkey. Two broadcast emails were sent to members with email. Regent Lisa Doan followed up with a third email. 223 members responded to the survey which represents a 69% response rate. 90 or 40% of the respondents indicated they would be willing to receive the yearbook electronically. The board agreed to an additional measure to save the chapter money by distributing yearbooks at the Annual Tea held in early September.

Chapter yearbooks and dues notices emailed and mailed on September 4 to members including life members, new members, and associate members.

- 284 letters/packages mailed total postage cost: \$386.08
 - 216 yearbooks and dues notices postage \$1.63 each (cost: \$352.08)
 - 68 dues notices postage \$.50 each (cost: \$34 for a savings of \$76.84)
- 41 yearbooks/dues notices and 22 dues notices were set aside to distribute at the Annual Tea.
 Additionally, eight yearbooks and one dues notice for members residing in Cedarfield Retirement Community were set aside for Bana Caskey to deliver. (for a savings of \$91.37)
- Additional costs: Envelopes (\$80.62), Labels (in-kind donation), printing of cover letters (in-kind donation), printing of tea invitations (in-kind donation), printing of dues invoices (in-kind donation). The costs for the yearbook and the Constitution Week bookmarks are listed elsewhere. Fewer yearbooks were printed as a result of the response from members indicating their willingness to receive an electronic version of the yearbook.
- Total Cost: \$466 (hand/electronic delivery cost reduction \$168, a 36% savings)

- Letters for each category of membership were printed
- Dues notice and accompanying national donation opportunity sheet printed

- Yearbooks picked up and Constitution bookmarks added to the mailing
- Mailing assembled, sorted by category, and stamped

2018-2019 Mailings to members without access to e-mail - Key chapter announcements were mailed with the assistance of the chapter treasurer to 28 members.

2018-2019 Additional Duties

- New members received a welcome email that included links to our online resources and an electronic copy of our chapter yearbook. New members were given the option to receive these materials in hardcopy form.
- Revised the Treasurer Reimbursement Form, providing an electronic version.
- Thank You letters and condolence letters were sent throughout the year at the request of the regent and other board members.
- Created and mailed invitations to March VDAR Memorial Service for family of members who had passed away.
- Created and mailed anniversary invitations to members celebrating milestone anniversaries at May chapter meeting.

General Comments

The increased use of electronic means to communicate with the membership has not only saved the chapter money, demonstrating that the chapter is a good steward of our funds, but it has reduced the time requirement to produce mailings and enabled a timelier outreach. While realizing the effectiveness of the use of email, the chapter has continued to provide printed materials to those members who are unable to receive electronic communications or who prefer printed materials. It has been an honor to serve as corresponding secretary for the Commonwealth Chapter, supporting the regent and the other members of the board of directors in the fulfillment of their duties.

The DAR Schools Committee has continued collecting Box Tops for Education and gently used costume jewelry for donations to selected DAR Schools.

At this time, the Commonwealth Chapter has collected 454 Box Tops and approximately 13 pounds of jewelry.

This brings the total of Box Tops donated for the year to 618, including the ones already sent to schools in December 2017.

when I began my chairmanship for the DAR Schools Committee, my instructions were to collect Box Tops and Jewelry, but I had no idea how much more we could have explored with this committee. I have given some suggestions for the future.

Our Regent, Lisa Doan, requested that we come up with a "tidy and eye catching" way to collect both the jewelry and Box Tops at the Chapter Table each meeting. I obtained the "Blue Bins" for the chapter and embellished with a red and white striped ribbon to help stand out amongst the other items on the Chapter Table. Each chapter meeting, I brought the bins to the Chapter Table, collected donated jewelry, box tops and more recently, used printer cartridges, to send to the designated schools when a saturated supply was available.

Our Regent requested that the Box Tops be divided between each of the DAR Schools that accept them. These were collected, trimmed, and sent with a letter from the Commonwealth Chapter acknowledging the number of box tops and date of the donation.

The used jewelry was collected from June 2017 until September 2018, when I hand delivered the Commonwealth Chapter's donation to the Crossnore School and Children's Home, on our way to Asheville, North Carolina for a personal trip. In past years, a method of free shipping was available to the Commonwealth Chapter, but during my tenure, this free method was eliminated and other than a member transporting the donations in person, (an 8 hour drive), obtaining a new budget item, or an in-kind contribution was necessary to get the heavy jewelry to Crossnore.

In February 2019, I gave an In-Kind donation of over \$40 to ship more jewelry to Crossnore School. A budget line item has been added for this Committee to fulfill this obligation in the coming term.

My Recommendations for the next DAR Schools Chairman:

Go to the NSDAR National website and read all you can find in the DAR Schools section. If possible, give a brief, (3 minute) highlight of one school in every other Chapter Meeting, or 3 in one year and 3 in another, or place an article on each school in our Chapter newsletter. The DAR Schools have a rich history and the schools we continue to support and sponsor are doing wonderful work in hard-pressed communities throughout the Appalachia and the North East. Many of our newer members may not be aware of this storied past.

As far as numbers of donations, please find that information compiled below: The total number of Box Tops donated for June 2017 to June 2018 was 618.

In early September 2018, the Commonwealth Chapter hand-delivered approximately 13 pounds of jewelry to the Crossnore School & Children's Home.

In December 2018, Commonwealth Chapter sent an additional 150 Box Tops for Education to the above schools.

Totaling 604 Box Tops collected during the calendar year Jan. 1-Dec. 31, 2018.

We collected an additional 16 pounds of jewelry for Crossnore School, for a total collection of **29 pounds of jewelry during the 2018 calendar year.**

Thanks to the continuing generous donations from the Commonwealth Chapter members, over **23 pounds of jewelry were shipped to Crossnore School on February 1, 2019.**

At this time, May 2019, we have collected 22 Box Tops for distribution, and a few additional pounds of jewelry.

A new and lucrative program is the reimbursement of used printer cartridges for the DAR Schools Committee. The State DAR Schools Chairman has requested we collect at least 20 pounds of Laser Toner or Inkjet cartridges, before using the prepaid shipping envelopes supplied to each Chapter. At this writing we have 6 Inkjet Cartridges, which total less than 1 pound.

With adequate promotion, I believe we can increase our donations and continue to support the DAR Schools.

The DAR Good Citizens program recognizes outstanding high school seniors who exhibit the qualities of good citizenship in the homes, schools and communities. I contacted senior guidance counselors responsible for awards at the ten schools designated by NSDAR to our chapter in August and presented the details for selection of one senior from their school.

The student selected as the school's DAR Good Citizen must have the following qualities:

Dependability (truthfulness, honesty, punctuality, etc.), Service (cooperation, helpfulness, responsibility, etc.),
Leadership (personality, self-control, initiative, etc.), Patriotism (unselfish loyalty to American ideals)

The student selected for each school is presented with a DAR Good Citizens pin, certificate and wallet recognition card and is eligible, if he/she wishes, to enter the The DAR Good Citizens Scholarship Contest. I had five schools (Douglas S. Freeman High School, The New Community School, Thomas Jefferson High School, Trinity Episcopal School, and Varina High School) participate in nominating a DAR Good Citizen; four of those students chose to participate in writing a proctored essay to be judged for the Scholarship Contest and I received them by the November 1, 2017 deadline. The four entries submitted were judged by two non-DAR member high school history teachers from out of state, and both judges selected the same winning entry, which was forwarded to the State Chair by the December 15, 2017 deadline. I, along with committee volunteers, will attend each of the five high school's senior award ceremonies in late May and Early June to recognize the five Good Citizens with their awards. The educational materials will be self-contained, so staff will be able to grab a box and go to off-site programs, reaching far beyond the walls of the Museum. The cart will move from the exhibition galleries to outside and will be staffed by Museum Interpreters during Museum hours as well as at events. The national committee will review the applications and we will have word whether the grants have been approved sometime in May. On November 8, 2018, the Commonwealth Chapter dedicated French's Tavern at 1600 Old Buckingham road in Powhatan, VA. with a bronze NSDAR Historic Marker. The plaque reads. "Historic French's Tavern Built in the 1700's Commonwealth Chapter National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution Dedicated November 2018."

Frances Eppes IV originally owned the property known as Swan's Creek Plantation. His granddaughter, Martha Wayles Skelton, married Thomas Jefferson and he acquired the property. The plantation home was operated by Hugh French and called French's Tavern. The current owners are Carolyn and Fred Neurhor, who purchased the property in 1993.

Carolyn Neurohr is a Commonwealth Chapter member and gave those attending a tour of the Tavern and property at the time of the dedication. Members of the Goochland Historical Society were in attendance along with Past Historian General and Honorary Virginia State Regent Bana Caskey, Regent Lisa Doan, Historic Preservation Chair Marcy Thomas and Commonwealth Chapter members.
